The directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2024.

#### **Directors' responsibilities statement**

The directors are responsible for preparing the Directors' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'. Under company law the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company and of the profit or loss of the Company for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies for the Company's financial statements and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the Company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### **Principal activities**

The principal activities of the Company is the advancement of the clinical sciences of clinical biochemistry, immunology and microbiology in the United Kingdom.

#### **Future developments**

As we prepare our annual report for the year ending 2024, I am pleased to share an overview of our financial performance and to highlight the developments that are helping shape a sustainable and ambitious future for the Association for Laboratory Medicine.

The most significant achievement of the year was the successful delivery of our renaming and rebranding project. This important milestone allowed us to better engage a wider, more diverse community of scientists, clinicians, researchers, and innovators. It provides us with a strong foundation as we move forward with our new strategy and enhanced membership offer.

Since 2023, we have introduced a range of new member benefits, including access to online learning through the LabMed Learning Academy, a new mentoring platform, and improved training and support for trade union reps. We also removed fees for members attending regional meetings, whether online or in person and harmonised our bursary application process. These developments have strengthened our membership offer, and we are pleased to report continued growth in membership. The number of members in our fee-paying category rose by 4.2% in 2024, contributing to an overall increase of more than 11% since 2020.

The new simplified membership fee structure introduced in January 2023 has improved transparency and is helping to stabilise membership numbers. However, it has led to changes in the profile of income received from subscriptions. To support the long-term sustainability of the Association, we introduced an above-inflation increase in membership fees from 2025, and we anticipate subscription income will increase again from 2027 as initial long-term discounted rates come to an end.

We saw growth in a number of other areas throughout the year. Our flagship national conference, LabMedUK24, returned as an in-person event and included a celebration of the 20th anniversary of Lab Tests Online UK. A return to a full exhibition as well as sponsorship packages supported a strong financial outcome despite slightly lower delegate numbers due to the location. We anticipate continued growth in income from this event in 2025 and 2026. A review of the Education and Training committee structure and terms of reference gives us the opportunity to review our training offer to members in 2025.

Our investment income also grew, contributing to the management of a year-end deficit which, while slightly higher than forecast, was well controlled.

We invested in the capacity and expertise of our team in 2024, particularly to support learning and events. These staffing changes have enhanced our ability to deliver value for members and contributed to the successful implementation of new initiatives. Staff costs rose as expected, but we continued to reduce costs in other areas through careful supplier review and efficiency savings.

Journal income continued to reflect sector-wide pressures, but we implemented a refreshed advertising strategy that we expect will help close this gap in 2025.

Towards the end of 2024, we appointed a new non-executive director to our Council following a successful recruitment process. Fen Sung, an investment manager, will lead a review of our investment strategy and reserves policy over the course of 2025 to ensure that we are making the most of our financial assets and planning for future sustainability.

Our work with corporate members and strategic partners continues to develop. We entered a new partnership with Roche Diagnostics and secured funding from the Univants of Healthcare Excellence Awards to support participation in LabMedUK25. We finished the year on a high with the announcement that LabMed has been selected by EFLM and IFCC to host EuroMedLab27 in London—an exciting opportunity that will generate further income and increase our visibility on the international stage.

In July 2024, we began work on our next five-year strategy (2025–2030), bringing together Council and subject specialists for a dedicated planning workshop. This strategy will ensure that we continue to focus our efforts and resources on the areas where we can make the greatest impact, supporting our members and contributing to the

advancement of laboratory medicine.

We continue to maintain a strong financial position, with reserves sufficient to support core operations for an extended period. Our long-term financial strategy remains focused on diversifying income streams, reducing risk, and creating the flexibility we need to grow and innovate in the years ahead.

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below:

As part of our planning process:

- Identifying and testing journal entries and the overall accounting records, in particular those that were significant and unusual.

- Testing key revenue lines, in particular cut-off, for evidence of management bias.
- Obtaining third-party confirmation of material bank and loan balances and investments.
- Documenting and verifying all significant related party balances and transactions.
- Reviewing documentation such as the board minutes, for discussions of irregularities including fraud.
- Reviewing and challenging the assumptions and judgements used by management in determining that there were no significant accounting estimates.
- Performing a physical verification of key assets.

Owing to the inherent limitations of an audit, there is an unavoidable risk that we may not have detected some material misstatements in the financial statements even though we have properly planned and performed our audit in accordance with auditing standards. #### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

#### 1. General information

The association is a private company limited by guarantee, incorporated in the United Kingdom (England and Wales). Its registered office and principal place of business is 130-132, Tooley Street, London SE1 2TU. The company registration number is 00863235.

#### 2. Accounting policies

#### 2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Section 1A of Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006

The association is a parent undertaking of a small group and as such is not required by Companies Act 2006 to prepare group accounts. These financial statements therefore present information about the company as an individual undertaking and not about its group.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

#### 2.2 Going concern

The association's forecasts and projections, taking account of possible changes in trading performance, and also from its level of reserves show that the association can meet its liabilities as they fall due.

On this basis, the directors consider that the company will continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and accordingly consider it appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

#### 2.3 Turnover

Turnover is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the turnover can be reliably measured. Turnover is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding discounts, rebates, value added tax and other sales taxes. The following criteria must also be met before turnover is recognised:

#### Rendering of services

Turnover from a contract to provide services is recognised in the period in which the services are provided in accordance with the stage of completion of the contract when all of the following conditions are satisfied:

- the amount of turnover can be measured reliably;
- it is probable that the company will receive the consideration due under the contract;
- the stage of completion of the contract at the end of the reporting period can be measured reliably; and
- the costs incurred and the costs to complete the contract can be measured reliably.

Annual subscriptions are allocated according to their renewal date. Subscriptions relating to the year are included in the Statement of Comprehensive Income and those relating to the following year are shown in creditors as deferred income.

#### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

#### 2.4 Interest income

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss using the effective interest method.

#### 2.5 Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to profit or loss over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

#### 2.6 Borrowing costs

All borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the year in which they are incurred.

#### 2.7 Pensions

The association operates a defined contribution group personal pension scheme for its employees. Annual contributions by the association in respect of the group personal pension scheme available to staff members are charged to the Statement of Comprehensive income in the period in which they are payable.

#### 2.8 Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in profit or loss except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date in the countries where the Company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the reporting date, except that:

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

#### 2.9 Intangible assets

Intangible assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, intangible assets are measured at cost less any accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses.

All intangible assets are considered to have a finite useful life. If a reliable estimate of the useful life cannot be made, the useful life shall not exceed ten years.

The estimated useful lives range as follows:

Software - 4 years

#### 2.10 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

The Company adds to the carrying amount of an item of fixed assets the cost of replacing part of such an item when that cost is incurred, if the replacement part is expected to provide incremental future benefits to the Company. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised. Repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in profit or loss.

#### 2.11 Valuation of investments

Investments in listed company shares are remeasured to market value at each reporting date. Gains and losses on remeasurement are recognised in profit or loss for the period.

#### 2.12 Debtors

Short-term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### 2.13 Creditors

Short-term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### 2.14 Provisions for liabilities

Provisions are made where an event has taken place that gives the Company a legal or constructive obligation that probably requires settlement by a transfer of economic benefit, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are charged as an expense to profit or loss in the year that the Company becomes aware of the obligation, and are measured at the best estimate at the Statement of financial position date of the expenditure required to settle the obligation, taking into account relevant risks and uncertainties.

When payments are eventually made, they are charged to the provision carried in the Statement of financial position.

#### 2.15 Grants and Bursaries

The association provides grants for research purposes on an annual basis. Grants are included in the Statement of Comprehensive Income when the grant award has been made and therefore when committed.

#### 2.16 Financial instruments

The Company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors, loans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in ordinary shares.

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of comprehensive income.

For financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and best estimate of the recoverable amount, which is an approximation of the amount that the Company would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the reporting date.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Statement of financial position when there is an enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

The company has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all its financial instruments.

#### 2.17 The Provision of Agency Arrangements

The company has taken on contracts that includes an element which is under an agency arrangement. All monies received as an agent is included within other creditors, and payments made under the agency arrangement, once paid, reduces other creditors. Funds held within cash at bank prior to payment is therefore held as a agent and is disclosed in the balance sheet.

#### 3. Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

To be able to prepare financial statements in accordance with FRS 102, the company must make certain estimates and judgements that have an impact on the policies and the amount reported in the financial statements. The estimates and judgements are based on historical experiences and other factors including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable at the time such estimates and judgements are made.

In the view of the Directors there are no significant estimates or judgements.

#### 4. Turnover

The whole of the turnover is attributable to promoting the advancement of Clinical Biochemistry and Laboratory Medicine. All turnover arose within the United Kingdom.
